## Principal Economic Activities

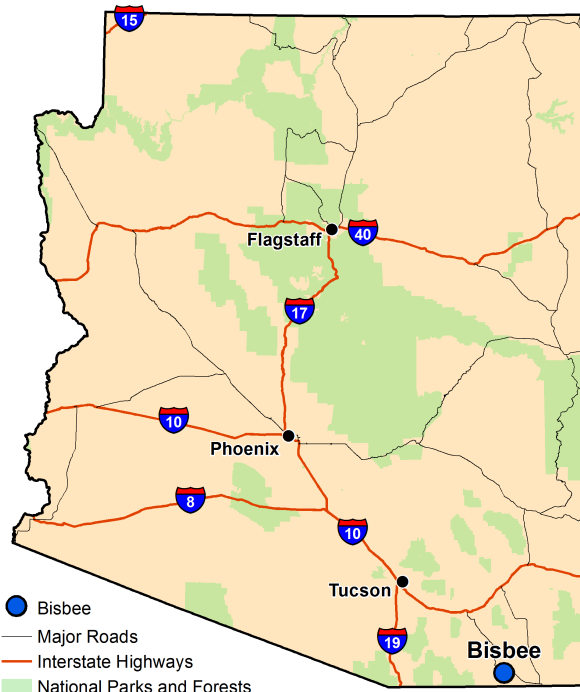
Bisbee was once a rich copper mining town that's mineral deposits played a tremendous role in the Arizona Territory attaining statehood, as well as future politics in the state. The great wealth that came from mining can be seen today in the incredible architecture that has been carefully preserved by forward-thinking community members. In the 1970s, bohemians seeking a refuge from the mundane found in Bisbee a unique environment that continues to inspire creativity and imagination, from the youth to the young-at-heart retiree.

## Scenic Attractions

Bisbee's history and its art are intertwined as one strolls the narrow streets and alleys, as well as Bisbee's 350 historic staircases. Enter another time when you visit a museum housed in a 1890s building that was the first rural Smithsonian Affiliate, or experience what it was like to be a miner at the Queen Mine Tour. From Old Bisbee, take a short five-mile drive to the suburb of Warren, one of Arizona's first master-planned communities, which offers visitors a chance to experience baseball at one of the country's oldest ballparks. And located seven miles from the international border, discover for yourself how Bisbee is partnering with cities in Sonora, Mexico, to improve the quality of life for all in this new Arizona-Sonora region.

## Community Facilities

Bisbee offers many amenities and activities for all its citizens, and it is the ideal place to raise a family, as well as a great place to spend your retirement. The City of Bisbee offers beautifully landscaped parks, a historical library, tennis and pickleball courts, as well as a swimming pool. Cultural activities include the Bisbee Farmers Market, infamous mining contests in Brewery Gulch, the Bisbee Blues Festival, the Historic Home Tour, the Bisbee Stair Climb, Bisbee Pride, the Mariachi Festival, the Annual Chocolate Tasting, the Altered Book Show, the Sidepony Music Festival, Alice in Bisbeeland and numerous other festivals throughout the year that offer fun and entertainment for all ages.
